Making Cheshire Safer


In July 2020, Cheshire Fire Authority approved its Integrated Risk Management Plan 2020-2024 (IRMP). This is a multi-year plan that sets out how the Authority will provide fire and rescue services across Cheshire to address the risk we face and meet the needs of the communities we serve.


Since the development of the IRMP, the Covid pandemic over the past two years has seen significant change for many of us. Therefore, in Autumn 2021 the Authority consulted on its 2022-2023 Annual Plan, which reviewed our IRMP, outlined revisions to our original plans and contained actions to address new and emerging risks. The Authority approved the Plan in February and it sets out our priorities for the next 12 months.

Over the coming year, the Authority will progress the expansion of its Rapid Response Rescue Units across our on-call fire stations to improve our response

to road traffic collisions and other emergencies. Work will also commence to introduce a day crewing shift system at Wilmslow, an effective and efficient way of providing fire cover for the area without the need to bring in other resources from elsewhere in Cheshire to support the station.

The Authority will continue to modernise its estate, including construction of a new fire station at Crewe. This will provide our firefighters and communities with the facilities befitting a modern fire and rescue service, while improving our energy efficiency and reducing our carbon footprint.





The year ahead will also mark the start of our planning for a new four year plan to set out the Authority's direction for 2024 and beyond. The new Plan, which is expected to be subject to public consultation in Autumn 2023, will outline how the Authority will address fire and rescue related risks to keep the communities of Cheshire safe.





Facts and figures

Cheshire Fire and Rescue Service operates:

- 28 Fire Stations
- 3 Community Safety Centres
- 3 Community Fire Protection Offices
- Shared headquarters with Cheshire Constabulary
- An Operational Training facility
- Safety Central, our public safety education centre

The Authority provides a 24 hour service to just over 1 million people and employs some:

- 714 firefighters and fire officers
- 165 community safety and professional services staff



Fire budget 2022–23

The Fire Authority has agreed a budget of £46.59 million to

provide a fire and rescue service to the communities of Cheshire East, Cheshire West and Chester, Halton and Warrington areas for 2022-23.

A total of £31.96 million will need to be raised from local Council Tax, which is equivalent to £82.48 for each Band D dwelling. This is a rise of 1.99% or 3p a week for a Band D home.

The budget equates to a cost per resident of just 84p per week.
